31st Annual Meeting of Shareholders

President Tim Towarak called the 31st Annual Meeting of the Bering Straits Native Corporation (BSNC) Shareholders to order at 10:02 AM on October 1, 2005 in the Mini Convention Center at Nome, Alaska. Dan Karmun, Sr. gave the invocation. President Towarak introduced the BSNC Incorporators: George Bell; Chuck Fagerstrom; Fred Katchatag, Sr.; Maggie Olson, widow of Martin Olson, Sr.; and Barbara Trigg, widow of Jerome Trigg, Sr.

Chairman Henry Ivanoff welcomed everyone and asked each member of the Board of Directors to introduce themselves. President Towarak introduced staff: Jerald Brown (Vice President), Wally Powers (Chief Financial Officer), Matt Ganley (Vice President of Land & Resources), Irene Anderson (Assistant Land Manager), Nolee Sebwenna (Accounting Clerk), Denise Olin (Accounting Clerk), Rose Koezuna-Clark (Receptionist), Peggy Hoogendorn (Vice President of Administration), Josie Reader (Assistant Controller), Myrna Outwater (Assistant

Stockholder Registrar), Kimberly Gooden (Administrative Assistant), Gail Schubert (Executive Vice President), Tom Peterson (Inuit Services), and Cheryl McKay (Attorney).

Election Judge Mitch Erickson announced the close of registration and reported that a quorum was established. The Annual Meeting of Shareholder minutes of October 2, 2004 were approved. Nominations Committee member Stephan Ivanoff announced the incumbent nominees as follows: Roy Ashenfelter, Johnson Eningowuk, Homer E. Hoogendorn, Henry Ivanoff and Eileen Norbert. Other nominees running included: Laura J. Fahey, Neal W. Foster, Andrew C. Miller, Jr., Stanley Okpealuk, Sr., and Fred N. Sagoonick. Judge Erickson handed out ballots to those who registered to vote at the Annual Meeting. Judge Erickson opened for the floor for balloting and set the time limit for 10 minutes. Five Early Bird prizes were drawn.

President Towarak read the list of former and current Board of Directors. President Towarak and Chairman

Ivanoff presented a plaque and BSNC jacket to the BSNC Incorporators.

George Bell expressed his appreciation and thankfulness for BSNC honoring him and the other Incorporators and former Board of Directors.

Chuck Fagerstrom reflected on the early 1970s and how they worked on enrolling people in BSNC and the first Annual Meeting in April of 1973. Chuck said that 34 people ran for the BSNC Board of Directors and that 59% of the shareholders voted.

Chuck read an excerpt of what Jerome Trigg, Sr. had addressed to Congress on October 23, 1969: "We

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BSNC GREETINGS

The Bering Straits region is going through the “peak” of our winter months with the holidays just around the corner and a new calendar year right behind. It is a time of the year when we look at highlights of the current year and make plans for what will take place next year. For our “corporate family,” the past calendar year has been good for BSNC, and we have expectations that the coming year will also be a good year.

The largest growth in BSNC has been in government contracting through the Small Business Administration (SBA) program, popularly known as the “8(a) Program.” Regrettably, this program has been under attack by some other 8(a) companies from outside Alaska, and an effort is underway to limit or change the ANC 8(a) program. It’s important to note that where ANC 8(a) companies are indirectly owned by hundreds or even thousands of shareholders (over 6,600 for BSNC), many “Lower 48” 8(a) companies are owned by a small number of individuals or small group of partners. Because of these continuing attacks, there is a potential that this source of funds for BSNC could be affected in the future. We are closely monitoring this development because of its importance to BSNC and all other ANCs and their 8(a) subsidiaries, and have participated with the other ANCS in policy meetings to protect the ANC 8(a) program.

Another source of increased potential revenue for BSNC is based on the high price of gold, hovering around \$500 per ounce. As long as this is maintained, there is continuing interest in developing our subsurface resources. Rock Creek outside of Nome and Big Hurrah around Solomon are our best potential for immediate development. This is helping to create a better environment between our regional and the village corporations because each entity (the village corporations own the surface estate and BSNC owns the subsurface estate) has to work closely with the other to make this happen in our region.

An exciting event this year at our Annual Shareholders meeting was the recognition of our former BSNC Board members and the focus of that was the recognition of our five original incorporators or their survivors. We had Barbara Trigg of Nome, widow of Jerome Trigg; Maggie Olson of Golovin, widow of Martin Olson; Fred Katchatag Sr. of Unalakleet; George Bell of Fairbanks; and Charles Fagerstrom of Nome invited, with all but Fred making it to the meeting. Each was given a plaque recognizing them as our “founding fathers,” an accolade well deserved. They played an important role in the formation of BSNC.

As to what the future holds, we can only speculate. If this past 12 months is any indicator, it could mean BSNC is on its way to joining other successful ANC’s. With the annual meeting returning all incumbents to the BSNC Board, there seems to be general satisfaction with the direction for growth and profitability set by the current Board. Two young shareholders who ran for the Board had a very good showing, and we are encouraged by the interest shown by them. Knowing that our current terms cannot last forever, I encourage our younger shareholders to keep up their interest in our Company. After all, the future is in their hands.

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did not invent the wheel, but the wheel doesn't work on tundra and snow. We developed sleds instead and the skin boats. We have learned to adapt to the new things if they are useful: outboard motors, snowmachines and other items."

"Jerome was an integral part in representing Nome and the Bering Straits region back in Washington, DC," Chuck said.

"Martin Olson was our Vice President and this was during a busy time of his life when he operated the landing craft and his air service," said Chuck. Chuck reflected on Martin wearing green or blue coveralls, coming to the meetings directly from his job.

"The speeches have brought back many memories when Martin would fly from Golovin to attend BSNC meetings in Nome," recalled Maggie Olson. "I am thankful that you folks have recognized Martin and the rest. Quyanna," Maggie

said.

President Towarak presented his report on the operation of BSNC and its subsidiaries. Jerald Brown, Vice President, and Wally Powers, Chief Financial Officer, presented the financials for FY 05 and the financial forecasts for FY 06. Charles Johnson, Chair of the Land & Resources Committee, introduced the Land & Resources Committee and Matt Ganley, Vice President of Land & Resources. Matt Ganley gave an update on activities of the Land & Resources Department and answered questions. Irene Anderson, Assistant Land Manager, provided information on rock and gravel sales, Golden Glacier, Inc., and Sound Quarry, Inc. Matt Ganley, Executive Vice President of Bering Straits Foundation (BSF) provided information on the BSF. Clara Langton, Secretary/Treasurer of BSF, informed the group on fundraising efforts of BSF and informed everyone that the next BSF Auction will be held November 4, 2005 in Nome, AK at the Mini Convention Center. Gail Schubert,

Executive Vice President, introduced Mike London, General Manager and Senior Vice President of Eagle Electric, LLC. Gail Schubert presented information on the operation of the 8(a) subsidiaries under BSNC. The last five Early Bird prizes were drawn.

Judge Erickson announced that all 5 incumbents were re-elected: Roy Ashenfelter with 170,313.155 votes, Johnson Eningowuk with 147,491.719 votes, Homer E. Hoogendorn with 170,870.101, Henry Ivanoff with 223,379.732 votes, and Eileen Norbert with 179,133.404 votes.

Elder of the Year plaques were presented to elders selected by their village corporations. President Towarak thanked all those present at the 2005 Annual Meeting of Shareholders and said he was very pleased in the turnout of shareholders from out of town. Chairman Henry Ivanoff thanked all the shareholders for attending the 2005 Annual Meeting. Maggie Olson gave the benediction and the meeting was adjourned at 2:23 PM.

2005 BSNC Elders of the Year

BSNC presented awards to the “Elders of the Year” as selected by the Native Village Corporations. Ruth Ivanoff Johnson of Unalakleet Native Corporation; Phillip Dexter of Golovin Native Corporation; Helen Curran, Sr. of Solomon Native Corporation; Frank Ahnangnatoguk of Sitnasuak Native Corporation; and Faye E. Ongtawasruk of Wales Native Corporation were the recipients for the 2005 BSNC Elders of the year.

Frank Ahnangnatoguk, Sitnasuak Native Corporation

Frank was born on August 5, 1923 in Shishmaref to Lena and Johnny Ahnangnatoguk and raised with 5 brothers and 5 sisters. He lived in Shishmaref from 1923 to 1936. After the 1936 fire in Nome, he and his family, moved to Brevig Mission. Four months later they moved to Teller for one year and then relocated back to Brevig Mission. Frank married Edna Eyuk in 1950 at the Covenant Church in Nome. Together they had 4 children: James (deceased), Alma, Ronald and Florence. They have 8 grandchildren. Frank served in the Alaska Territorial Guard from 1942 to 1944 in Brevig Mission under the leadership Les Bronson. He was honorably discharged by Walter Hickel. Frank worked for Hammond’s Gold Mining at Sunset Creek, Coffee Creek and in Teller. He managed the store for Mrs. Tweet at Lost River. For 10 summers Frank worked as a heavy equipment operator for the Alaska State Department of Transportation working on the roads between Teller and Sinrok. Frank and Edna enjoy camping with their children and grandchildren at one of their 4 campsites: Teller, Tisuuq, Ingulik and Fort Davis, where most of the subsistence activities are taken place. At the Tisuuq River camp they built a rock wall 100 feet long, 10 feet wide and 5 feet high which saved the cabin during the 2004 storm.



Faye E. Ongtawasruk, Wales Native Corporation

Faye E. Ongtawasruk was born on December 30, 1930 in Wales, Alaska to David and Jessie Iokeinna. She was employed by the Bering Straits School District at the Wales Kingikmiut School as the Cook and Bilingual/Bicultural Teacher for a number of years. She speaks her language fluently and likes to teach it to her grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She loves to pick berries and greens, and enjoys gathering wood. In 1993, she was one of the local elders, along with her daughter Barb Weyiouanna that revived the Eskimo dancing and taught the children and interested community members during her bilingual hours and weekly practices. Faye owns the local Reindeer Herd.



Ruth Ivanoff Johnson, Unalakleet Native Corporation

Mrs. Ruth Johnson is a member of the Unalakleet Sewing Circle. Recently, she served on the Covenant Church board, and many years ago on the original Norton Sound Health board, in which was successful in bringing the hospital to Nome. Ruth has also worked as a postmaster in St. Michael prior to moving to Unalakleet. Ruth, along with her now deceased husband, raised twelve children to become successful and contributing adults to the communities they live in.







Koyuk Native Corporation Builds New Tank Farm

Koyuk Native Corporation's (KNC) new tank farm was completed in the fall of 2004 with a total of three gas and oil containments. The Bering Straits School District (BSSD), Alaska Village Electrical Company (AVEC) and KNC each own a containment. KNC has a seven 27,000 gallon tanks, two 12,000 gallon tanks, and a 3,000 gallon day tank. KNC holds gasoline and diesel. AVEC has five 27,000 gallon tanks and BSSD has three 27,000 gallon tanks that hold diesel fuel. According to John Kavairlook, Sr., the KNC tank farm is "up to date" technology wise. "We can operate our gasoline and fuel pumps from the KNC store unlike how we had done it in the past by opening up the gas pump and filling our customers with gas or diesel manually," said John Kavairlook, Sr. CE2 Engineers was contracted to complete this project and hired local laborers to build the tank farm.

Inuit/JK Hill

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The base contract began on Oct. 1, 2005, and has nine one-year options.

"Bering Straits Native Corporation has been providing logistic support services through our 8(a) certified subsidiary for the past two years," said Bering Straits Native Corporation President Tim Towarak. "This is our most significant contract to date and we are honored by the opportunity to provide this service to the Air Force."

"We are extremely pleased to be affiliated with the 3rd Wing operations and look forward to providing outstanding services to the units assigned to the 3rd Wing," Gail Schubert, President, Inuit Services said. "This is a great opportunity to demonstrate Inuit Services' abilities while generating revenue to benefit Bering Straits Native Corporation shareholders."

The contract requires the team to provide the personnel, equipment, tools, materials, lighting, supervision, training and other items or services necessary to manage supply operations at the base. Services to be performed include general supply services, inventory control, customer support and training services, contingency planning and mobility support. The team will also be responsible for supply-related actions associated with F-22/C-17 bed-down at the base.

A task order under a subcontract with the Inuit/JK Hill joint venture will be issued to MTC Technologies, Inc. MTC is a significant provider of engineering, technical and management services to the US Department of Defense and will assist the joint venture in management supply operations at Elmendorf.




