



Do you know these card games?



Use all 52 cards. Deal 7 cards to each player. When you have a pair, you play it. Each turn, one player asks another for a card. For example, “Can I have an 8?” If the other has it, they hand it over. If not, they say “Go fish.” and the person draws a card. The person who runs out of cards wins.

Each person gets seven cards. One card is played face up. On your turn, you play a card of the same number or color as that card. If you don't have one, draw a card. When you get down to one card, you have to say "Uno." The person who runs out of cards first wins.

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Rules

1. In your groups, choose a board game.
2. Learn how to play it.
3. Write down simple English rules and instructions.
4. Teach your classmates to play the game.

Tips

1. Keep explanations short.
2. Tell people what to watch.
3. Show examples.
4. Learn as you go.
5. Play in pairs at first.
