MINOR TRUST DISTRIBUTION 2024

Osoyoos Indian Band, Chief and Council, has been in consultation with OIB's Lawyers, regarding, Per-Capita Distribution for registered OIB members who are MINORS (18 and younger).

1. Chief and Council has decided (with legal advice), that it is in the best interest of all OIB Member Minor's, to place 100% of the Minors share of Distributions, Per Capita's into their Minors Trust Fund, which is what most Bands do.
2. The Council is giving all OIB parents/Guardians a ten (10) month notice, that starting December 2024, in the best interest of each OIB member Minor that OIB will place 100% of each child's portion in their Minor's Trust Account.
3. All Parents and Guardians will still be able to request a form (approved by Council) to withdraw funds, but, for specific purposes and limits only by doing the following.

Filling out an Application, fully and completely and handing it to any Council member or Joanne McGinnis (accounting department). All withdrawal applications, will be presented and approved at a regular Council Meeting.

The reasons for parents and guardians to request monies from the member child Trust Account, will be limited to Education, Medical and Sports.

If payments are approved, they will be paid directly to the provider of the service.

BALANCING BUSINESS, BEARS, AND BABIES:

LIFE AFTER CAT GRADUATION

Centre graduate, Jay Falkus has certainly made the most of his time since graduating from not one, but two programs! We caught up with Jay recently to find out all about his latest endeavors and what advice he'd share with up-and-coming creatives. Read on to find out!

Let's Start at the Beginning Shall We...?

Q: What program(s) did you take at CAT and when did you graduate?

A: Upon completing my [Professional Filmmaking](#) diploma in January 2011, I found myself increasingly drawn to photography. Realizing there were gaps in my knowledge, I decided to enroll in the Professional Photography program, which led to my graduation in April 2014.

The Sky's the Limit After Graduation!

Q: What has life looked like for you since graduating? (career and personal achievements)

A: Life, like for many others, presented its share of challenges. Yet, since graduating, I've welcomed two children, embarked on my entrepreneurial journey, and recently assumed the role of Executive Director at Bears' Lair Dream Camps.

Q: What were some of your first career goals after graduating and were you able to achieve them?

A: Following the completion of both programs, I held a strong desire to launch my own business. It took a few years to transition into full-time entrepreneurship, but eventually, I made it happen. Given my maturity at the time of starting each program, achieving a work-life balance post-graduation didn't pose much difficulty.



Q: You mentioned your new position as Executive Director at Bears Lair Dream Camps? Tell us more!

A: My journey with Bears' Lair Dream Camps began nearly two years ago when I crossed paths with Geena Jackson, the creator and producer of Bears' Lair TV. Through filming another project, I learned about her upcoming TV show, which eventually led to me filming behind the scenes for the TV show. This is where I heard of the inception of Bears' Lair Dream Camps. These camps, designed for indigenous youth, focus on entrepreneurship and life skills development across Canada. Initially, my involvement was limited to filming and photography, but after a couple of camps, I transitioned into a mentoring role.

It's All a Balancing Act

Q: CAT programs are intensive, how did you “find your balance” again after graduation?

A: One of the pivotal lessons I've learned is the necessity of maintaining a healthy work-life balance. For me, this involves establishing a dedicated workspace outside of home when working remotely and ensuring work stays at the “office” after hours, whenever possible. While our current team operates at a fast pace, we aim to expand in the future to achieve a better balance.

Any Wise Words to Share?

Q: Words of advice for up-and-coming creatives?

A: Adaptability has emerged as another crucial lesson. Whether navigating diverse teaching styles during my studies or coping with the challenges posed by unforeseen events like the COVID-19 pandemic, adaptability has been instrumental in both my personal and professional life. My advice to future students is to embrace adaptability and seize every opportunity to learn, especially in the realm of business, as it forms the foundation for success in self-employment.



Communique – July 2024:

Columbia River Treaty Agreement in Principle

The Syilx Okanagan Nation acknowledges the completion of an Agreement in Principle (AIP) between Canada and the United States to modernize the Columbia River Treaty (CRT), which is a milestone in the Canada-US CRT negotiations:

Importantly, the AIP sets out an approach that will result in ecosystem and cultural values being considered in CRT dam operations and measures being taken to support salmon in the Columbia River system. A modernized CRT will not just focus on power production and flood control as is the case currently. These are critically important measures, but there is much more work to do to address CRT impacts on the Nation.

Canada entered into the CRT with the US in 1964 to coordinate flood control and optimize hydroelectric energy production on both sides of the Canada - US border. It was entered into without any consultation with, or consent from, the Syilx Okanagan Nation. It resulted in the construction of three major dams in the Upper Columbia Basin that flooded the Slocan Valley (Arrow Lakes) and converted the Upper Columbia watershed into a massive reservoir system, resulting in the devastation of large swaths of Syilx Okanagan Nation Territory, the loss of Nation members' ability to exercise rights in areas of the Territory, and desecration of ancestral burial and cultural sites.

Canada and the US started renegotiating the CRT in the spring of 2018, as the guaranteed flood control provisions otherwise terminate in September this year. Through the hard work and dedication of Syilx Okanagan leadership, Canada granted observer status to the Syilx Okanagan Nation (along with the Ktunaxa and Secwepemc Nations) in 2019. This has allowed the CEC's negotiating team to participate in the negotiations with the US - an international precedent and a testament to the strength of a unified approach. Canada and BC also committed to seeking the free, prior and informed consent of the Nation to the terms of a modernized CRT.

The Nation's involvement as observers in the negotiations was important for the protection of the Nation's Aboriginal title and self-governance rights in the tmx^wulax^w. However, the completion of an AIP between Canada and the US is just one step. Although we are on a path of reconciliation with Canada and BC in relation to the CRT, whether true reconciliation will be achieved will depend on the success of ongoing domestic negotiations with Canada and BC on compensation for the impacts to the

Nation's lands, waters, ceremonies and people; long-term revenue sharing of CRT-related benefits; and a meaningful role in decision making on CRT-related matters. The CEC looks forward to making progress in these negotiations over the coming months.

We still have lots of work to do before the Nation can consider providing free, prior and informed consent to a full modernized CRT. In the meantime, much work also remains for Canada and the US to draft the text of the modernized CRT based on the terms set out in the AIP.

ABOUT RIGHT TO PLAY'S PLAY PROGRAM

The Promoting Life-skills in Aboriginal Youth (PLAY) Program uses play to build essential life skills and promote health and well-being among children and youth. The Community Mentor is an employee of the community's Band or urban organization and has chosen to deliver the PLAY program with the support of Right To Play from **September 4, 2024 to August 29, 2025**.

PROGRAM POLICIES

The following policies apply to the PLAY program

- The Community Mentor and Right To Play staff are obligated to report any suspected abuse.
- Right To Play and my community's PLAY program have a zero tolerance policy for violence, verbal aggression, drugs or alcohol. The Community Mentor will remove anyone found engaging in such activities.

PARTICIPANT WAIVER OF RIGHT AND RELEASE

PLEASE READ CAREFULLY. This is a legal document. By agreeing to and signing this registration form you are giving up certain legal rights including the right to sue. you are also assuming certain obligations and risks. Notwithstanding precautions taken, accidents and unfortunate circumstances can occur and therefore this waiver of right and release must be agreed to and signed before you can participate in the program. If you do not understand this waiver of right and release, seek clarification from a legal advisor.

By signing this registration form, the participant(s) named below (or if a participant is under the age of 18, the participant's parent or guardian), acknowledge, consent and agree that, in consideration of being allowed to participate in the PLAY program:

- The named participant(s) is able to participate in the full range of activities and events, which may include but are not limited to games, leadership workshops, arts and crafts, and sports.
- The named participant(s) is able to go on supervised excursions outside program space/centre, which may include but are not limited to land-based activities, trips to theme parks, community/recreation centres, swimming pools, neighboring communities and university campuses.
- The named participant(s) is able to participate in surveys, provide feedback and share stories about their experience in the PLAY program.
- Certain Community Mentors and Right To Play staff members may, as a courtesy, provide transportation to and from the PLAY program for the named participant(s). I agree to assume all of the risks and responsibilities associated with such transportation, without any right to claim against Right To Play, its staff members, employees, directors, officers, agents, representatives, volunteers or the Community Mentor (the "**Releasees**") for any injury, loss or damages whatsoever the named participant(s) may suffer as a result of such transportation (including, but not limited to, personal injury, death or property damage).
- In the event of an accident, injury or illness affecting the named participant(s), the named participant(s) may receive emergency medical care by a first responder or health care professional. This may include notification of community paramedics or the administration of first aid by the Community Mentor, Right To Play staff, or other local staff/volunteers who may or may not have first aid training.

- In the event of an accident, injury or illness affecting the named participant(s), the Community Mentor and/or Right To Play staff may authorize all procedures, including admission to hospital and necessary treatment therein, as they may deem necessary or prudent for the care and well-being of the participant. Such action shall be taken only when immediate contact with the named Parent/Guardian cannot reasonably be made.
- I will not hold the Releasees responsible or liable for any injury, loss or damages, occurring to the named participant(s) during Right To Play activities, including but not limited to any injury, loss or damage which the named participant(s) may suffer as a result of first aid administered by the Community Mentor, Right To Play staff, or other local staff/volunteers.
- I recognize that participation in the PLAY program is at the risk of the named participant(s) and I agree to assume full responsibility for any injury, loss or damages which may occur to the named participant(s) in the course of their participation in the PLAY program.
- I hereby waive, release and forever discharge the Releasees from any and all actions, causes of actions, damages, lawsuits, claims, demands, costs, expenses and any other liability for any injury, loss or damages (including, but not limited to, personal injury, death or property damage) resulting directly or indirectly from the named participant(s) participation in the PLAY program.


